St Thomas Church Epiphany IV February 2, 2020 rmcneely+

I have not found so great faith No, not in (all) Israel

We continue the Epiphany theme, the manifestation of our Lord to the world, Jesus is slowly revealing himself Who He is What mission God has sent Him to accomplish on Earth

We continue to walk in Jesus' shoes, to experience His life on Earth

In today's Gospel, we break in to the story just after Jesus has preached the sermon on the Mount, near the beginning of his earthly ministry.

A sermon that may have left some,

Wondering about Him

The sermon was wonderful and it was disturbing at the same time.

As Jesus pulled into Capernaum

That little town on the northern shores of the Sea of Galilee Close to where the Jordan River enters the Sea The place that was something of a base for Jesus

He is surrounded by people

By the curious By supporters By detractors And by the helpless begging His miracles Already known to many

Jesus must demonstrate His connection to God By making natural things happen In most unnatural ways If He was to convince people who He was He had to show them that He was different That He was the Son of God. Here on Earth to save them Save them from themselves From their sins He had to show them the way to God Put yourself in the sandals of a Jew in Galilee What would persuade you that this unusual Itinerant, unemployed, impoverished, uneducated 30 year old son of a deceased carpenter; a single man from Nazareth who is wondering around Galilee Was the Son of God? What would persuade you If that same man Had walked through those doors 20 minutes ago and sat in our pews? How would we know Him? Could He say anything that would convince us That He was Jesus returned? In Galilee Jesus healed many people He cured them of disease for which there was no cure He restored sight, hearing and speech to those who had lost it forever He raised them from the dead He fed thousands with food that was not enough for a dozen He had to persuade them He was the Son of God. By His actions

He offered irrefutable proof

In the story for today

We see him heal two people

Two very different people

In two very different ways

The leper was a Jew

The disease was greatly feared

It lead to a lingering death

Victims were cast out of society

Scorned and shunned

Out of the temple

They lived in squalor on the streets

Competing with the dogs for food and water discarded by others

The leper approached Jesus,

Fell to his knees And said: "Lord, if thou wilt, thou canst make me clean" In an expression of absolute faith He asked to be rid of the disease Jesus did what was unthinkable He touched the man contact was thought to be a sure means for contracting the disease But Jesus touched him

And he was instantly cured

The other man was a Centurion of the Roman Army

A commander of 100 men

In order to rise to the rank of Centurion A man had to rise through the ranks He was not a nobleman or highly born He started in the Roman Legion As the lowest of soldiers He was promoted to successively higher rank Over a long period For bravery in battle For loyalty to his commanders For diligence and following orders For his ability to lead men Centurions were paid well by Army standards They were not wealthy but had all they needed There are 5 Centurions mentioned in the New Testament And all of them are portrayed favorably Just as this man is portrayed in Matthew's account They are men of honesty Of courage Integrity Of Strength of character and they were morally tough They follow the law and their orders But they are men not afraid to learn and speak the truth

But unlike the Jew, the Centurion is a Gentile

A heathen

And unlike the leper, a man of stature in society

A man in good health

The Centurion and the Leper could not be more different from each other

The leper sought healing for himself The Centurion of another A slave, his slave

A slave, his slave

One would think that a man who killed in battle for a living Would have little regard for the life of a slave A possession Any more than he might for a sheep or a cow that he owned One dies or exhausts its purpose, you buy another to replace it Easily done for a Centurion Under Roman law it was not illegal for the Centurion to take the slave's life
For the last 3 Sundays we have been reading St Paul's epistle to the Romans It has been the section of Romans Where Paul describes how a Christian must live
The life he describes is rigorous Different from what most of us do every day

Alarming really

This Centurion is acting as if he had read Paul's Epistles in the last 4 weeks. He is concerned for a slave

In the way that St Paul directs that we all should care for each other.

He approaches Jesus and begs for the life of his slave some miles distant Who is grievously tormented

And when Jesus offers to go there The Centurion says "speak the word only and my servant shall be healed"

This Roman soldier This heathen This gentile Tells Jesus that if Jesus but speaks the word, The miracle is done Long distance Not even in Jesus' presence The miracle is done. So what starts out looking like a story of Jesus healing two people Turns out to be a lesson for us about Faith And that is where we need to go next; Faith It took great faith for the Leper to even approach Jesus Faith that he would not be severely punished For walking up to him Faith that Jesus could and would heal him. It took great faith for the Centurion to call Jesus off the journey to where the slave lay tormented. Both of these very different men showed the absolute faith they had in this man Jesus. So what are we talking about when we talk about faith The seminary definition is from the book of Hebrews: "Now Faith is the substance of things hoped for The evidence of things not seen". Substance and evidence Both subjective terms That take long meditation to discern. Perhaps the Spanish 16th century St, Teresa of Avila said it best: Faith and the love of God makes possible that which to natural reason is not possible.

Christian Faith should never be confused with blind faith Ours is the product of thought and study Our faith is the result of our work and lifelong experience.

Blind faith, I believe, you will find withering and temporary Our faith, call it our St Thomas Faith

Endures

But it is not the product of scientific inquiry or proof Yet it is an equally valid means of establishing the truth As any rigor of science

Applied to earthly matters I have faith

that the sun will rise each morning over Mt. Diablo Where we live.

I know this

not because I have done some experiment

not because I have myself studied astro-physics

and know the principals that govern our Sun and the Earth

I know this from my own experience

My own observation And perhaps from the opinions of people I respect in the field.

Just as I have faith

That my good wife loves me.

Not from some experiment

Not from some treatise on physiology or psychology

Not from science

But from the years I have spent with her

From my own observations

From my own feelings toward and from her.

I have faith in the substance of the love hoped for

And my faith is the evidence of the love we share that is unseen.

Just as I have Faith in the Resurrection of Jesus, the Christ I have read the accounts I read, studied and thought about His book, the Bible I have spoken with others whom I respect I have felt the effect of His forgiveness in my soul And seen it in others Just as I have faith in God's creation I have spent a lifetime with all that He made I have experienced the miracle I have seen the incredible complexity The beauty And I know to a certainty And I know to a certainty And I have faith that God created it all.

Faith is as valid a means by which to know a fact As any other means known to mankind.

Each of us is born with a modicum of faith For some it grows and flourishes For others it withers and dies

On occasion our Faith is tested.

We struggle with our faith in God when bad things happen to good people. Our faith is occasionally diminished in these times.

And our adversary the devil rushes into the cracks to poison our souls.

But we go back to basics

To study To scripture To prayer To the church and its teachings To our clergy To each other To God. And we restore our faith And over time We replenish the substance of things hoped for With the evidence of things not seen.

Just as any athlete trains a set of muscles with constant work out and training We must maintain our faith Work on it Nurture it Develop and maintain it.

So the question for us this morning is this

Is our faith Call it our "St Thomas" faith The degree of faith that we of St Thomas possess Equal to that of the leper and the Centurion?

Will Jesus say of us

Verily, I have not found so great faith No. Not in all of San Francisco
