Render therefore unto Caesar the things that are Caesar's and unto God the things that are God's

I must set the scene:

It is a few days after Jesus' triumphal entry into Jerusalem The day we remember as Palm Sunday. The Pharisees were shocked to see the multitudes The spirit of the people The accolades they heaped upon Our Lord The affirmation that He was the Messiah The shouts of Hosannah in the Highest The Pharisee's are nervous They accurately perceive Jesus as a threat. A threat to their position, status and influence. Their power, control and wealth.

This man Jesus will turn the social order on its head and the Pharisees cannot see how it could end well for them.

They have been plotting for weeks to try to trick this self proclaimed Son of God into disfavor, rebuke and scandal, with the end to put Him to death as quietly as possible. All without success to their great frustration. One of them has come up with another trap.

This one they know is so clever that there is no escape.

It is a perfect quandary.

And no matter which way Jesus answers,

he will be downfallen.

It deals with taxes:

The annual Tribute that all Jews had to pay to Rome.

Failure to do so meant sedition and certain death.

Rome allowed the Jews to have their own currency. But the Romans

But the Romans

did not want to fuss with exchange rates

and the potential destabilization of the Jewish coinage.

So the annual tribute could only be paid with Roman money.

The Pharisee's asked Jesus to declare whether it was lawful to pay Tribute unto Caesar or not? The trap was laid.

If Jesus said yes, it was lawful, he alienated a large segment of the Jews who opposed Roman reign and who advocated not paying the tribute or at least not paying it with Roman money in protest. Caesar professed to be a god and the Jews worshiped only the God of Abraham,

Isaac

and Jacob.

To make things worse

Caesar's image was minted onto the Roman coinage and was a vain idol to the Jews.

They could not have the Roman coin in the Temple or on their persons

for fear of desecration and blasphemy.

Jesus would be hated by the Jews if He said

"yes" it was lawful to pay the Tribute..

If Jesus said it was not lawful to pay the Tribute,

He would be guilty of sedition

and the Pharisees need only turn Jesus over to the Romans with testimony

that He was encouraging the Jews not to pay their taxes and Jesus would be executed within hours.

But Jesus seeing the trap; did neither.

I practiced law and have been in the interrogator's shoes. You have the perfect question.

And no matter what the answer your cause is advanced. You build the trap.

Asking the foundational questions,

all the while innocuously eliminating any means of escape. You tingle with anticipation.

You ask the killer question waiting for the trap to spring shut.

But it didn't happen.

Jesus has again out smarted the Pharisees.

You can almost feel the interrogator jerk upright in surprise, Huh.

What just happened?

Jesus turns the trap into an occasion

to teach a fundamental truth of Christianity echoed today in Saint Paul's Epistle to the Philippians.

The question in the Gospel may have been in the realm of taxes (the inevitable cost of civil government of all ages) but the principal concerns life.

Jesus said "render unto Caesar that which is Caesar's".

Some see this Gospel as divine instruction as to the division of the obligations of citizens and the obligations of Christians.

St Paul resolves it in favor of Our Lord in today's Epistle He observes:

"Our citizenship is in Heaven".

You see, our primary allegiance is to God.

We are coming to the end of a Presidential Election Cycle One that will be remembered as particularly contentious.

The event recounted in today's Gospel And Jesus' instruction: "Render therefore unto Caesar the things that are Caesar's And unto God the things that are God's" Has prompted some to lead into a discussion of the proper Relationship of Christianity to National Citizenship. And it has become customary in some pulpits to launch into advocacy for one political view point or another. That cannot and will not happen here. Because the potential exists for the interruption of the love and harmony that is characteristic of our little miracle church. I congratulate and applaud your restraint I know there are deeply held opinions That span the political spectrum among you. But you have not allowed it to divide you And you have kept your focus on God.

The Church leaves to your good judgment

What to render unto Caesar.

But has great interest

in the determination of what we are to render unto God. The Greek term translated "render"

literally means "to give back"

in the sense of paying back a debt that is owed.

Taken literally then, Jesus is saying And "render", or "give back" to God, that which is God's.

The coin was easy because it had Caesar's image stamped on it. It goes back to Caesar.

What do we know in our lives that bears the image of God? Let's go back to Genesis:

There are three verses that command our attention:

"And God said, "let us make man in our image"... And;

"in the image of God, He created them man and woman." And:

"When God created mankind he made them in the likeness of God".

So the image of God is stamped . . . on us?

Are we the currency of God?

If so; are we to give ourselves back to God?

Are we inclined to give God all that we are?

If our minds (as least for an hour or two on Sunday), what about our hearts?

But God wants all 168 hours of that week.

We cannot say that "this part of my life belongs to God

so I will give it to God,

but this area of my life is none of God's business.

What of our income? Maybe we give 1 or 2% or maybe the entire 10% tithe.

But God wants 100%

What of creation? God made it all and it too bears His image. Are we to give it back to Him? How?

We are stewards of everything God created.

The last time I was in the Yosemite Valley I took a walk to Mirror Lake in the placed chill of a Fall morning as the sun was beginning to warm the granite walls. In the still of the dawn, the majesty of it all was almost palpable

How can anyone fail to see the Hand of God at work in that peaceful morning light?

We give it back to God, by being stewards of all He created.

We are stewards of the pinnacle of God's creation: Our fellow human beings.

We give ourselves back to God by caring for each other Especially those who cannot care for themselves.

Everything we are and everything we have

belongs to God.

Everything we are and everything we have

we are to give back to God.

We are but managers or stewards of these gifts God has given to us.

Imagine for a moment, what it would look like if we gave our entire being to God.

Our homes would not merely be a private place for ourselves where we rest from our day's work,

where we eat

and sleep.

They would be sanctuaries that offer

comfort,

peace,

encouragement

and love.

Our families would not only be a bunch of people who share the same bathroom and compete for the TV remote

but would be centers of worship, a place where godly values are shaped and molded and where unconditional love, understanding and forgiveness are lived out.

Our possessions,

would not be the things that portray our value to others, not be the evidence of who we are,

but we would use all our material assets to glorify God.

We give ourselves back to God because we are His.

He created us

to reflect the radiance of His love, His compassion, His friendship. As we live our daily life in all we do.

As we leave through those virtual doors today, let us contemplate the things in our lives that God wants us to give back to Him.

Render unto God that which belongs to God. Give Him our lives Let our lives be an act of worship In His glory and honor.
