Saint Thomas and Saint Thomas of the Air Epiphany I January 9, 2022 rmcneely+

And all that heard Him were astonished At His understanding and answers.

I was a young man before the manner in which the Gospels Had been put together finally hit me.

And with my discovery,

I decided the dusty old men who put the prayer book together might just have known what they were doing

and it might be a good idea for me to pay some attention. It didn't occur to me that everyone else

had made the same discovery much earlier in their lives.

I have always been grateful that I did not boast

of my new discovery

to Father Morse who was the parish priest at the time,

or to my Grandmother who helped bring me to God.

You see, after reading and hearing the Gospels for a decade or so It finally hit me that beginning on Christmas Eve

And ending on the day of Ascension In the first half of the Christian year The Gospels were selected and arranged To re-tell the story of the earthly life of Jesus From beginning to end.

So far this ecclesiastical year we have celebrated His birth, his circumcision and naming, the visit of the Magi his escape to Egypt and exodus to Nazareth Today we consider the only Biblical account of His youth In the interesting and intimate account

of one of the Holy Family's annual Passover journeys to the Temple in Jerusalem.

I can never read this story without recalling the words

Of Archbishop Provence, when he taught the story

In the St Thomas Bible Discussion Group He introduced the broad outline of the journey to Jerusalem And then he said:

How could Joseph and Mary ever explain it to God? Uh, God: we lost your Kid.

I should first dispel the notion that Joseph and Mary were at fault or in some way less than ideal parents in this mishap.

We need to travel back to Galilee and Judea in the time the Holy Family:

The Passover journey to Jerusalem took place every year

At the same time of the moon

And devout Jews made the trip every year.

So there were annual re-acquaintances and reunions along the way

As more and more people joined the throng.

The men lead the way and tried to restrain their pace so as not to be separated from the women and children by too great a distance.

The women brought up the rear with the little children

And the older kids were corralled in between.

As the journey progressed, the group swelled as more and more people stepping in.

They numbered in the thousands.

And pretty soon it was a great distance between the front and the back of the group.

They all met up at the evening campsite to enjoy a meal And good friendships, perhaps some singing

And story telling around the campfire.

That is when parents were often reunited with their children.

Now 12 year olds then just as 12 year olds now

Were an independent lot.

And while the kids felt they were free to do as they pleased

They were well supervised by thousands of parents

Even if they were not their own parents

And were safely guided along the way.

And so it happened on the return journey

That Jesus was not missed.

On the first or second night.

But on the third, Joseph and Mary became worried

And worked their way through the crowd looking for Jesus All the way back to Jerusalem and the Temple.

And here is where things get interesting and where the focus of the story takes us.

I know the relief that Joseph and Mary must have felt when they found him

I once lost my precious little boy at the Napa County Fair And when I found him eating an ice cream cone in the lap Of a police officer at the temporary headquarters

I was relieved and elated to no end.

So here was Jesus,

This 12 year old boy Sitting among the elders, The scribes The scholars, the doctors, the equivalent of our Ph.Ds. The teachers And He had them spell bound. "Astonished" is the word that Luke uses.

It was not only his youth But His limited opportunity of experience in the backward village of Nazareth. His knowledge was obviously vast But He had no formal education Had not studied for years at the rabbinical school of Hillel or Shammai as they had.

Yet, He was their superior in knowledge and understanding.

Who was this young man? And how had He come to such a position of mastery?

The question hangs in the air for us to contemplate.

Jesus' divine nature comes to mind as a possible answer. One of the insoluble mysteries of the Church is that Jesus Was fully Divine And fully Human At the same time. The Natures were indivisible And completely separate, that is; not melded together

Jesus' wisdom and knowledge as observed by The doctors of the Temple Could therefore have been the product of his birth And His Divine Nature.

- Was it possible that He was born with all that And as His human nature matured He could express it?
- Or did He maintain close contact with His Father And over His first 12 years, was tutored?
- Or was God and the Holy Ghost speaking through Him For the three days that He held their rapt attention?

Whatever the answer, the question for us as we follow the Epiphany of Our Lord;

His manifestation to the world is: "How does Luke's account of these events Edify us and our search for Jesus?"

I can't speak for the other Christian denominations But for us, The Anglican expression of Christianity We cannot get very far before there is some study to do.

Without the foundation of the History The scripture The liturgy The rich symbolism of the communion service Its colors Its gestures Its gestures Its sounds and bells Its vestments Its statuary, even the crucifix Without a knowledge and understanding We are just a silly group of mindless, irrelevant inebriates Bobbing up and down in the pews. It is the major hurdle in welcoming people to the Church.

They arrive by the Grace of God

They are warmly welcomed

But they are soon lost

When they encounter the complexity and depth Of Anglican thought.

Few people today,

unfortunately and especially our youth are capable and willing to devote the effort it takes to gain the understanding and knowledge that makes Anglicanism so richly rewarding.

Our lives are increasingly plagued with the expectancy Of immediate gratification.

In almost every facet of our lives there is an almost instant reward that is far greater than the effort it took to achieve it.

Just consider for a moment what it takes to gain the answer of almost any question, mathematical calculation, historical fact Cultural trivia or literary reference. Isn't it common in a group of people when someone asks an innocent question And everyone dives for their phones In the competition to see who can get the answer first?

With the click of a few buttons, the answer is in hand.

Almost no effort for a complete reward. Obtained in a fraction of a minute.

Is it any wonder that people come to us with similar expectation And leave with a glazed over look in their eyes when they get an answer that takes a 10 minute explanation? Never to be seen or heard from again.

The Anglican expression is said to be like unto a three-legged stool And founded and strengthened by

Scripture,

Tradition and reason.

When any leg is weakened or missing

The stool and the disciple, postulant, student or aspirant Who sits upon it,

Collapses and finds him or herself on the floor.

So as Jesus demonstrated for three days with the doctors of the Temple

There is much to learn Much to study A lifetime of learning in fact, If we are to meet Him in this or the next life.

And without that foundation and understanding in scripture, tradition and reason We cannot live our lives with much hope That the meeting with Our Lord Will be fruitful.

It is a lengthy and arduous process

We begin it here at St Thomas with Sunday School for the kids If all goes well

It continues with the education necessary for confirmation It continues with the Bible Discussion Group And is nourished every week right here

Solid scripture reading

Sermons steeped in doctrine and reason (at least some of the time)

Even the music reflects the history, theology and grace Of Anglican thought and practice.

Soon we will have the benefit of the James E. Provence Library And be able to borrow his books

That have been carefully assembled over 30 years.

It contains the classics of Christian education:

The fundamental building blocks of Christianity.

We meet Jesus at the altar every week

How are we to recognize Him if we don't know Him? How are we to know Him

if we don't spend the time and effort to understand?
